

DOROTHY CARNES COUNTY PARK

Dorothy Carnes County Park surrounds Rose Lake Marsh on the east, west and south shores. Rose Lake State Natural Area is one of the most diverse waterfowl areas in the county. The park accommodates hiking and cross country skiing, snowshoeing, nature study, bird watching, picnicking, and dog walking.

From the intersection of US Highways 26 and 12 in Fort Atkinson, go west 1.2 miles on USH 12, then north on Radloff Lane about 0.6 mile, then east to a parking area.

CAMROCK COUNTY PARK

This 440-acre park is located in eastern Dane County along Koshkonong Creek between the Village of Cambridge and the historic Village of Rockdale. This park has three separate shelter areas with playgrounds and also offers hiking, mountain and recreation biking, sledding at Shelter #3, snowshoeing, canoeing and kayaking.

CamRock County Park Shelters 1 and 2 are located off County Highway B between Rockdale and Cambridge. Shelter 3 is located on Highland Drive just north of Rockdale.

ROME POND STATE WILDLIFE AREA

Rome Pond State Wildlife Area, a large deep water marsh, sees heavy use by waterfowl. Its central feature is a large, open water cattail marsh surrounded by rolling hills. The pond not only provides habitat for migrating waterfowl but also nesting areas for many species like the Black Tern. The wildlife area provides excellent opportunities for waterfowl, deer and dove hunting as well as wildlife watching.

Located in east-central Jefferson County, primary parking and boat access for the wildlife area are east of the Village of Rome on County Road F.

Park Access
Jefferson County parks are open dawn to dusk, year-round. Call the Parks Department for shelter reservations.

Park Access
Unless otherwise posted or with the exception of those persons registered for camping, park use hours are from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Dogs are allowed on-leash in all parks. The Jefferson County Dog Park offers over 55 acres in off-leash exercise areas.

WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

Wildlife Areas are managed to sustain the wildlife and natural communities found on the properties and to provide a full range of traditional outdoor recreational uses.

Dogs must be on-leash from April 15th through July 31st.

The operation of motor and non-motorized vehicles, which includes snowmobiles, bicycles, and all-terrain vehicles, is restricted to designated trails posted for such use.

Hunting occurs on wildlife areas during the months of April, May, September, October, November and December.





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Location W8282 ELM POINT RD LAKE MILLS, WI 53551 (43.0706°, -88.9451°) Korth Park is located on the west side of Rock Lake near Lake Mills. A packed limestone bicycle trail along the shore of Rock Lake connects the Glacial Drumlin Trail to Cedar Lane. This trail connection creates a loop path around Rock Lake. A picnic shelter is located at the Elm Point Road entrance.

Korth Park is located off of Hwy S, north of Lake Mills, on Korth Lane.

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The 2,300 acres of the Goose Lake Wildlife Area are home to deer, pheasant, and ducks. Goose and Mud lakes draw numerous waterfowl and birds are likely to see sandhill crane, lesser scaup, blue-winged teal, mallard and wood duck. Location KRUEGER RD DEERFIELD, WI 53559 (43.0900°, -89.0489°) From Madison go east 10 miles on I-94 and take Hwy 73 south two miles to CTH BB. Head east on BB for 2 miles. Go north on Krueger Rd to parking area.

OUTDOOR RECREATION CLOSE TO HOME

The Glacial Heritage Area (GHA) is a network of parks, wildlife and natural areas, historic and cultural sites connected to each other and to nearby cities and villages by trails and waterways - like pearls on a string. The GHA is designed to reconnect people to the land through recreation, conservation and tourism. Parks in the GHA provide high-quality opportunities for residents and visitors to engage in outdoor activities such as hiking, biking, mountain biking, picnicking, horseback riding, fishing, wildlife watching and cross-country skiing. Several of the parks have effigy mounds and other historic features. The GHA also contains miles of linking trails that meander through the countryside, connecting conservation areas to the nearby cities and villages and to one another.

FAMILY GATHERINGS and PICNICKING

Looking for a scenic place to picnic with family and friends? Or a place to get out of the car, stretch your legs, and enjoy the rolling glacial landscape of southern Wisconsin? Or a quiet setting to simply sit under a giant oak tree and soak in the sights, smells and sounds of nature? If so, the many parks of the GHA offer all these opportunities and more. From the small woodlands of Fohlman, Riley-Deppe, and Rock River Parks with picnic tables, restrooms, and small play areas to the large CamRock, Carnes and Korth Parks with three-season shelters and a wider range of opportunities, the parks of the GHA are perfect places to relax and enjoy the outdoors. For dog-owners looking for a place their canine "kids" can run and play, the popular Jefferson County Dog Park just south of Johnson Creek is a top destination.

HIKING and WALKING

From short hikes at Mush-Ko-Se-Day Park and Langer Family Park to longer jaunts at Carnes, Aztalan, or CamRock, to lots more in between, there is an abundance of hiking opportunities in the GHA. Many hiking trails are well known and popular, but others, like the trails of Lake Ripley Preserve and Garman Preserve, offer opportunities for solitude and quiet. And don't forget the Wildlife Areas where visitors can follow the numerous natural paths, dikes and other routes, or roam to their heart's content through the scenic woods and grasslands.

- PADDLING**
- With several good sized lakes and the Rock, Crawfish and Bark Rivers, the GHA provides many paddling opportunities. Although a surprise to many visitors, significant stretches of these waters (particularly sections of the Bark River) are lined with a variety of forests and marshes providing paddlers with an unexpectedly wild experience.

RECREATIONAL and MOUNTAIN BIKING

Recreational and Mountain biking are rapidly growing in popularity and the GHA is becoming a premier biking destination. The Glacial Drumlin Trail runs east-west across the middle of the GHA while the Glacial River Trail cuts north-south. These trails pass through many of the area's cities and villages where riders can stop for lunch, coffee, or treats at the many cafes and restaurants. Together these trails form the backbone of a number of terrific rides utilizing the abundant, lightly-traveled rural roads throughout the GHA. CamRock Park provides a short but technically challenging mountain biking experience and the Kettle Moraine State Forest hosts over 20 miles of high quality mountain biking trails. In addition, trails are being designed for construction of the newly acquired Holzhueter Park.

WILDLIFE VIEWING and BIRD WATCHING

With the abundant wetland complexes and open water throughout the GHA, flocks of ducks, geese, and other waterfowl migrate through the area each spring and fall. Over 200 species have been recorded at Zeloski Marsh alone including Black Tern, Yellow-headed Blackbirds, Least and American Bittern, Wilson's Phalarope, Forster's Tern, Hudsonian Godwit, and Sedge Wren. Other popular places to see wetland birds include the system of dikes at Prince's Point WA, Rome Pond WA, Red Cedar Lake NA, Mud Lake along CTH G, Rock Lake, and Carnes Park. Warblers and other Neo-tropical migrants pass through the area in large numbers when the weather warms in May. A host of birds, ranging from very rare to interesting to commonplace have been recorded in the area including, Indigo Bunting, Northern Flicker, Dickcissel, Prothonotary Warbler, and Short-eared Owl.



Parks, preserves, and wildlife areas connected by trails and waterways ... like pearls on a string

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Waterloo State Wildlife Area, covers approximately 4,000 acres of diverse habitats. Good waterfowl hunting can be found at times on the restored wetlands. Wildlife watching opportunities abound and can be accessed from any of the parking lots on the property. Location STATE HIGHWAY 89 and ISLAND RD WATERLOO, WI 53594 (43.1803°, -88.9611°) Located in northwestern Jefferson County and southwestern Dodge County about one mile east of the city of Waterloo. The area is approximately 2 miles east to west and 7 miles north to south.



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The Lake Mills Unit contains three lakes with boat access at Rock and Mud lakes. The Zeloski Marsh Unit provides a home to waterfowl, shorebirds, and other wetland species. Both units have access lanes that make excellent opportunities for hiking, wildlife watching, and hunting. The Glacial Drumlin Bike Trail provides access for scenic spring, summer, or fall rides. The trail is used as a snowmobile trail in winter. Location ALLEY RD LAKE MILLS, WI 53551 (43.0542°, -88.9638°) As a starting point, travel to the southwest of Lake Mills on Hwy A, go north on Hwy S approximately 1 mile and turn west on Alley Road. Continue west 1 mile to the parking lot on the north side of Alley Road.

WINTER ACTIVITIES

When winter blankets the area, there are many options for getting outside in the GHA. Local clubs maintain an impressive network of snowmobile trails covering over 300 miles and the counties maintain over 200 additional miles in the GHA. With more than 25 miles of groomed cross-country skiing trails at Carnes, Korth, and CamRock Parks, there are ample opportunities for skiers. In addition, for those interested in breaking their own trails, skiers and snowshoers are free to go anywhere on the Wildlife Areas. And, for those seeking speed, Jefferson County maintains a popular sledding hill at Korth Park from the top of a drumlin down to Rock Lake.



HUNTING and TRAPPING

With over 30,000 acres of grasslands, oak forests and lowland hardwoods, marshes and wetlands, and open water spread out over the State Wildlife Areas, the GHA is a hunter's and trapper's paradise. Waterloo-Mud Lake, Goose Lake and Lima Marsh-Storr's Lake Wildlife Areas are popular deer, turkey and small-game hunting and upland trapping destinations. Over the last decade more than 10,000 acres of wetlands and pockets of open water have been restored within the GHA project area. As a result, the GHA boasts some of the largest and highest quality waterfowl hunting and wetland trapping opportunities in southern Wisconsin. Of particular note are Koshkonong, Prince's Point, Jefferson Marsh, and Lake Mills (Zeloski Marsh) Wildlife Areas.
